If it's more than just a bad day, share your concerns with us, we will listen and take appropriate action. Furness Vale is a good school because of the hard work and dedication of the staff, the amazing children who learn here and the wonderful support we get from parents. Your support and involvement mean everything to us!

Text Messaging

As you know, the funding that comes into schools has been significantly reduced over recent years and this makes us think, constantly, about creative ways to spend wisely.

The text messaging service we use is very expensive – over 5p per text. From September, we are going to trial using class Dojo as the main way to communicate messages to parents – this is a free service.

We will make sure all parents have a log in and ask you all to turn notifications on so that you get messages instantly. There will be a transition time in the summer term where we continue with text messages and trial the new method. We will be asking for your feedback so that we can find out if it's working, tweak what we do and make it as effective as possible.

Messy Monsters will be running again in January. It will be open to mums and care givers of pre-school age children.
